


The images opposite received Honours in the on-line competition held in conjunction with the Meeting on 6th September 2021.

The judge on the night was Alana MacClean who commented on the images and remarked on the high quality of members' work.




Agave Leaf Abstract by Trish Lovecek




Settings 1/60sec, f4, ISO 100, 100mm Macro Lens this image was taken with just daylight the container was suspended over some blue feathers on paper.



Another of our images shown on Tuesday night was a tree taken and processed by Roxanne using the “In the round “ technique. This technique was made popular by Pep Ventosa and a google search will bring up many of his images. The technique can be done in camera most modern cameras allow you to take up to 10 shots and blend them in Camera, however you have more creative opportunities if you take the photos and then use an image editing programme to stack the layers and blend them.



To achieve this effect, you don't need a fancy camera as you will be taking a number of images, you will find very high megapixel cameras will give you images that can take a long time to process particularly if you are using 30 or 40 layers. Trees are a good subject to start with, you can focus on the trunk and then take one image walk a few steps to your left or right and take another shot keeping the focus point still on the trunk of the tree repeat this until you have walked fully around the tree. You may have some shots where the lighting is challenging but you can mask out sun flare etc. in the processing.

When you have taken all your images you can load them into your computer and do any basic exposure editing etc. before loading them into a layer stack. You can use Lightroom or Adobe Bridge for this. In Bridge you select the images you want to use and go to Tools on the top menu bar – select Photoshop>Load files into Photoshop Layers.



In Photoshop select all the layers except the bottom one. Click on the second layer hold down the shift key and click on the top layer. Change the opacity of these layers to 50% you will already see the changes, you may need to select each layer and line up the trunk of the tree, you can also mask out parts on any layer that has a distracting element.

You can experiment with different blending modes on some layers to enhance the effect

The following is a contribution from a club member, please contribute something for the next issue. I already have a commitment from Vanessa our Secretary to write an article for us on how she took her ice flower images, get ready and eat all those frozen meals in the freezer, I did this technique some time ago and filled to freezer of the fridge on the Garage.

Its not the camera that takes an image it's the Photographer

Camera/Lens setup – Like with any other system, there's a difference between an entry level camera, and top of the line. You can get older m43 bodies for under \$200, while some of the best Micro Four Thirds cameras ring in north of \$3000.

The same applies to lenses, there are cheap lenses, and there are lenses like the Panasonic-Leica 42.5mm f1.2 for \$1600 or the Olympus Pro Series lenses anywhere from \$1200 through to \$12,000. Some of the best m43 lenses can be found around the \$800 to \$2000 range.

It's not the equipment, it's you. Let me bring up an analogy, if Tiger Woods went to Walmart and bought the cheapest golf clubs, he'd still kick your butt at golf. There's a lot more to cameras than sensor size. Full frame cameras do have many advantages no doubt. But do comparisons on dynamic range you'll get pretty close numbers.

“Mirrorless cameras don't have viewfinders.” Wrong! Panasonic has been incorporating viewfinders since the GX7 and Olympus has been doing it with the OM-D series. And viewfinders have always been available as hot shoe attachments. But let's talk about how that misconception could have arisen. DSLRs are mirrored base systems that allow for a through-the-lens optical viewfinder.

Have you ever heard your friends argue about what's better: Apple iPhone vs Samsung Galaxy, Windows vs Mac, etc.? It's kinda annoying, especially since most arguing haven't used both.

This doesn't stop them from regurgitating specs and features they read online. I've used both iPhone and the top-of-the-line Android phones. Both Windows and Mac. To me, it boils down to personal preference.

The same goes for cameras. Personal preference. Most cameras have their unique selling proposition; Olympus with its world class IBIS, Panasonic with 4k, Sony's full frame mirrorless cameras and of course the iconic Canon and Nikon which have dominated the industry for decades with an exceptional wide range of models and lenses.

At the end of the day, which camera you choose is up to you. Whatever format you decide on, **just be sure to invest in lenses** because there really isn't a bad camera, only bad photographers. A camera doesn't understand composition. It doesn't know how to light a subject. It doesn't bring expression out of a model, etc.

Final thoughts, I like Hunter S. Thompson's advice: skip the fancy equipment and just shoot.
